Westbound US 60 to close between Loop 101 (Price Freeway) and I-10 (March 21-24)

Motorists are advised to expect delays and plan ahead

PHOENIX – The Arizona Department of Transportation advises motorists to plan ahead and expect to use detours as westbound US 60 will be closed between Loop 101 (Price Freeway) and I-10 from 10 p.m. Friday, March 21, to 4 a.m. Monday, March 24, for a traffic shift. At the same time, the ramps from Loop 101 (Price Freeway) to westbound US 60 will be closed. In addition, the westbound US 60 on-ramps at Country Club Drive, Alma School Road, Dobson Road, McClintock Drive, Rural Road and Mill Avenue will be closed from 8 p.m. Friday, March 21, to 4 a.m. Monday, March 24.

<u>Eastbound I-10 detour:</u> Use southbound Loop 101 (Price Freeway) to westbound Loop 202 (Santan Freeway) to access eastbound I-10 beyond the closure.

Westbound I-10 detour: Use northbound Loop 101 (Price Freeway) to westbound Loop 202 (Red Mountain Freeway) to access westbound I-10 beyond the closure.

Airport Access: Drivers traveling westbound on US 60 heading to Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport should use northbound Loop 101 (Price Freeway) to westbound Loop 202 (Red Mountain Freeway) and use the Sky Harbor Boulevard entrance.

NOTE: Several other ramp and lane closures are also scheduled this weekend. For information about additional weekend restrictions and closures, visit i10broadwaycurve.com/alerts.
